## Glowing support for kidney patients

Fun run raises RM120,000 to aid underprivileged in need of dialysis treatment

THE Malaysia Agro Exposition Park Serdang (MAEPS) in Serdang was transformed into a night of illuminated fun and excitement for the NKF Glow Run.

Taking on a carnival-like atmosphere in conjunction with the National Kidney Foundation of Malaysia's (NKF) 50th anniversary, the event featured a luminous 5km fun run route lined with neon lights which saw more than 3,000 participants.

Leading up to the event, a convoy of luxury cars made stops at 1 Utama, Sunway Pyramid, and IOI City Mall, promoting kidney health and raising awareness of kidney disease before a car exhibition at the NKF Glow Run.

NKF chief executive officer Chua Hong Wee said, "Through this event, we are pleased to announce that NKF has successfully raised RM120,000 and three dialysis machines worth RM121,900, thanks to each and every one of our donors.

All proceeds from the NKF Glow Run will be channelled towards subsidising dialysis treatment for more than 1,700 underprivileged patients who are undergoing treatment at 28 NKF dialysis centres across Malaysia.

The event also saw the handover of three dialysis machines by H.T.C Motorcycle Club, Global Heal Group and Next Drive and Friends to NKF.

There are now more than 50,000 dialysis patients in Malaysia with 7,000 new patients every year.
